## Scientologists lose 'Mind

MR Justice O'Connor dismissed two applica-tions by the Church of Scientology yesterday for the editor of a provincial newspaper and the author of "The Mind Benders," a book on the cult, to be sent to prison for contempt of

The judge said on the third day of the hearing that he would give his reasons today.

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In the applications, the Church of Scientology had sought to commit to prison Mr Cyril, Vosper, the author, and Mr Ketth Whetstone, editor of the Conentry Evening Telegraph, which published an editorial commenting on the Foster Report on Scientology, last December.

The Scientologists claimed in court that Mr Vosper, a former Scientologist, and Mr Whetstone were in contempt of court because the book and the article in the newspaper might pre-

in the newspaper might pre-judice forthcoming libel actions in which the Church of Scientology is involved.

Mr Edward Gardney, QC, representing both the church and Mr Peter Dalton Ginever, as quible relations officer, said his clients were defendants in a libel action, which was being abrought by Mr Kenneth Robinson, former Health Minister.

"The church also sought com-mittal orders "or other punish-nent" against Neville Spear-Man LTD., publishers of the book, and Coventry News-tapers LTD., owners of the iewspaper.

## " Unreality " claim

Mr Leon Brittan, for Mr Whetstone and the paper's pub-ishers, said the church's appli-lation had "an air of grotesque inreality about it."

The libel actions would be heard in London next year and t was most unlikely that anyone from Coventry would serve on the jury.
