

Scientology: Money-keeps.

has amused vast sums of messy; during its 23-year history. Bob McKee examines how and where its money comes from.

Recent years have seen the blossoming of many strange and welrd religious cults.

The Church of Scientology may not be among the weirdest of these cults but it certainly must be among the richest.

During the past 20-years I. Ron-Hubbard has built up a network of "missions" and through them he has created a multi-national octopus: whose tenacies stretch far beyond the limitations of any one-country. Hubbard's cotopus delies financial analysis.

On a superficial level it's not difficult to see that the organization less in fact, making vast surus of money. Sulppets of information, news of new building purchases, and examination of the cost of Hubbard's Scientology courses, help-give some idea of the amount of money that's involved.

To attain "total freedom" and the powers that come with Scientology "processing" you have to climb up a very steep and expensive ladder: Following on from basic Scientology programs, you progress to courses like "Expanded Dianetics Completion", "Power Processing", "Salo Autitors Course", and so on to the "Clearing Course".

Once conquered, the person can then go on to do the OT levels meaning a trip to the church's:

advanced organizations.

In addition to all this there are many "special" processing programs-which any Scientologist may be required to take. They may be: inserted at various points within the over-all program: depending on what is levited necessary by the organzation. There are many of these courses under such headings as "PTS-Rundown", "CS-53. Runlown", "Integrity Processing" etc. Most of the courses come in ndividual packages. You pay for the course (see table) and hen spend the designated time anywhere between 50 - 100 ours each) completing them.

No complete cost figure can be given to the would-be Scienplogist because no one can say now quick or easily that person is going to minpt to the programs. A check on the amounts add in by six former Scienologists shows that between here they spent almost \$40,000 on various courses, over a

sald it can cost you as much as \$2,000 to reach Grade IV (regarded by Scientologists as still the beginners course), but viewed the money as well spent; spent; see the money flows into the church's coffers? Washington D.C. took in gross receipts totalling \$758,962.

Gerbino launched an advertising campaign in Les Angeles. He claimed 12 of the 25 top local radio stations carried Church of

Scientology broadcasts and in response around 300-people signed up for church courses. "The donations from just 12 of these people amounts to over \$50,000," he boasted.

More recently an internal "Briefing Sheet," showed that inthe United States alone the gross income from public sales and
"processing" at its centres amount to over \$35,000 for one week: Advanced organizations and \$Scientology International reaped in a further \$372,000 during the same period.

Money, however, is an aspect the church will not go into great detail—on... Accounts sheets are littered with Scientology Jargon

and abbreviations. Cetting to the core of just how much goes into the organization and how much goes out is almost an impossibility:

The church realily admits to having acquired "quite a bit" of property all over the world. Recently, it pald more than 55 million for a new Scientology establishment.

- More than \$17,000 was paid out over a four-week period recently

as-"commission" to field staff members who managed to sign up new recruits. Most of this commission is expected to go back into the organization as members use it to finance further and more advanced courses.

In internal documents the church issues "commendations" to individual centres that show "increased production", in other words, the more people signed

Centres are operated virtually one at competitive basis. The following Org Cos/EDs. FRs. LISH. COMMS and of course FEOs are HIGHLY COMMEND-ED for making at least one Org Payment Target, anocances a letter from the Board of Directors of the Churches of Scientology.

The bulk of the money flowing into the organization comes from the "missions" or "franchises" as they were once known. Ten per cent of all the money given to missions is passed on to the mother church Money given into these raissions cannot-be taxed.

There have been claims that the organization "pressurizes" franchise or mission helders to relinquish control of their missions on a regular basis so no individual can get too clear a picture of the amounts of money flowing into the organization.

The holder is told he'll have to take additional training. retraining, additional processing or new advanced courses. In the meantime the mission is to be handed over to the organization. If there is any objection or protests he becomes an SP, discredited and/or expelled. Once the books are handed over to someone new the staff will be pressurized to join the sea org., or advanced courses. This way no individual gets too powerful or is made aware of what is going on," said an going: ex-Scientologist.

One member to back up the claim is Raymond Kerap of Tustin, California, who alleges the California mother church "pressurized" he and his wife Pamela to hand over the local mission last year. The incident is now part of \$2.5-million lawsuit filed by the Kemps against officials of the church.
